Salam sejahtera and good day from Malaysian Youth Diplomacy, a youth focal point in Malaysia focusing on empowering youths within the diplomatic discourse, consisting of more than 3000 empowered youths. We stand before you to address the crucial principles that should ground our commitments in this groundbreaking declaration.

Adopting a holistic approach that integrates environmental, social, and economic considerations is essential, respecting cultural diversity and leaving no one behind.

In terms of practical steps at the global level, institutional mechanisms like a Future Generations Envoy and Intergovernmental Forum should be established to coordinate actions on a global scale. National Commissions and Youth Councils should be fostered to ensure local adaptation and youth participation.

Furthermore, integrating long-term thinking into educational curricula and establishing future impact assessments for policies are crucial steps to take future generations into account systematically.

As we look towards the Summit of the Future this year, our aims should be visionary and tangible. We must secure a concrete and actionable Pact for the Future, emphasising intergenerational responsibility and a holistic approach. Setting SMART goals, mobilising resources, and implementing an effective monitoring and evaluation framework will be instrumental in achieving tangible outcomes and holding nations accountable.

Empowering future generations requires the implementation of the proposed Future Generations Envoy role, the establishment of national commissions or youth councils, and prioritising education and skills development. Let us envision a future where our commitments today lead to a sustainable and equitable world for generations to come.
